## **CURRENT RESEARCH PROJECTS**

### *Russia's Adult Mortality Crisis: Poor Governance and Poor Health in the Post-Communist Era*

This project examines why Russian adult mortality (particularly male mortality) has increased even as GDP per capita has dramatically increased. Other studies have focused on economic variables like spending or gdp changes to explain why Russian adults, and males in particular, die relatively young. The leading cause of death is cardio vascular disease (CVD). Russians have not significantly increased their risk factors for CVD, however: prior to and throughout the transition from communism, they smoked heavily and remained heavy consumers of (hard spirits) alcohol. Thus, individual behavioral risk factors for CVD have remained relatively steady and do not explain the rapid increase in mortality since the collapse of communism, and particularly since 2000 when Russia's economy grew at an average rate of about 7% per year. My project looks beyond economic variables to political variables to look at changes in health care policy in Russia and particularly inequalities in access to Russia's health care system.

### *Evaluating International vs. Domestic Influences on Democratic Development (joint with Michael McFaul)*

This multi-year project (funded by the Smith Richardson Foundation) was launched in October 2006 and is based at the Center on Democracy, Development, and the Rule of Law. The project assesses the impact of international factors on democratic development around the world in the post World War II era. Organized around four main research modules - (1) democratic transitions; (2) democratic consolidation; (3) liberalization in non-democratic regimes, and (4) post-conflict reconstruction - the objective of the program is to produce a comprehensive evaluation of external influence that will be relevant to both policy-makers and academic communities in donor and recipient countries. The program includes both macro level (country) and micro level (specific mechanisms of intervention) studies, an approach that should offer unique comparative insights.
